THE BULLHEAD (Cottus gobio)

This small fish species, of between 5 and 10 cms (2 to 4 inches) in length has recently been found in the Tweed catchment for the first time, in a small tributary of the Ale Water. Breeding has not yet been confirmed. It is a native of the South and East of England, though it became established in Northumberland last century and is also found in the Braid Hills area near Edinburgh. It is a predator of Trout and Salmon fry and its arrival brings a new and unpredictable factor for the fish and the fisheries of the Tweed. Once established, alien freshwater species of any sort are virtually impossible to eradicate and their presence permanently changes the natural identity of the area, making it less distinctive and more like any other place.
